Companion Policy

Caregiver/Companion presence is not required during exercise therapy sessions, unless otherwise discussed prior to the start of a session.

With the client's permission, a caregiver/companion is welcome to observe an exercise therapy session so long as their presence does not distract, disrupt, or impede the execution of exercise therapy. This includes (but is not limited to) contradicting the exercise therapist and/or answering questions directed toward the client.

At the exercise therapist's discretion (and with the client's permission), a caregiver/companion may be asked to participate in the client's exercise therapy session. Due to liability, should the caregiver/companion agree, they understand that they must follow all instructions provided by the exercise therapist.

Pet Policy

Pets are not permitted at Pushing Boundaries. In compliance with Title III of the Americans with Disabilities Act, Service Animals are permitted. 'Service Animal' is defined as an animal specifically trained to provide assistance to a person living with a disability.

In compliance with the ADA, Pushing Boundaries has the right to request medical documentation supporting the need for a Service Animal.
